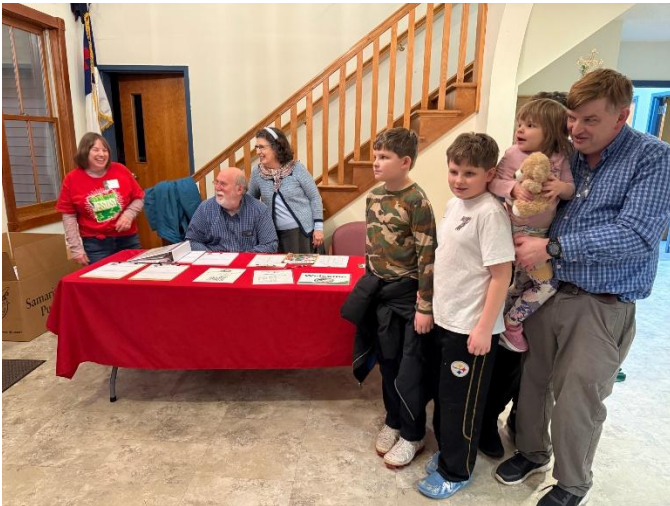


### Operation Christmas Child – National Collection Week

#### 'It's All About Jesus!'

The 2025 National Collection Week concluded on Monday, November 24 and the trailers left our parking lot on Tuesday, November 25 bright and early with **15,210 Gospel Opportunities!!**

From here the next stop is the OCC processing center in Baltimore, MD where each box will be inspected and placed into specific age-groups for boys/girls. Then they are on their way around the world to be delivered personally by ministry teams.



be counted and 'cartonized' (placed in shipping cartons). We welcomed individual donors, families, and area churches as they dropped off their packed shoeboxes- a total of 895 for the week.



Our church packed 114 shoeboxes including 39 from the summer Bergen Community VBS and 35 from Sunday School with many items donated by our congregation. We were so blessed to be able to include 70 beautiful drawstring bags that the Sewing with a Purpose group made as well as some hand-held stuffed dolls. I am sure these items will be treasured by children around the world.



The week started with the foyer being transformed into OCC central. Kevin used his skills to build a ramp for the carts to enter the center entrance from the sidewalk. It was used frequently throughout the week as we transported shoeboxes from donor's vehicles into the fellowship hall to







On Sunday and Monday (11/23-24) many strong hands were needed in our parking lot to help unload cartons of shoeboxes from the 14 area collection drop-off locations in the Genesee Valley Region. This year we used a roller conveyor set-up which allowed us to move the cartons more efficiently. Each carton needed to be numbered and tallied before being stacked high in the 3 trailers. On

Sunday, the volunteers were treated with pizza and cookies in the fellowship hall. We were blessed to have the Adams family provide a special time of worship music.

Although we did not meet our original goal of filling 4 trailers, we saw God's hand at work with each shoebox we did pack. The hope and prayer is that with **evangelism**, discipleship occurs, and with **discipleship**, **multiplication** occurs where families and communities will be transformed with the Gospel. An interesting statistic we learned is that God uses these shoeboxes and multiplies each by 8 other people that can learn of the life-changing love of Jesus Christ. That is so amazing.

I am so grateful and truly blessed by the love and support of each one of you who donated items/shipping costs, packed shoeboxes, volunteered during the week, as well as prayed for this life-changing, Kingdom-growing ministry.

## From the Pastor:

As I look back on my seven years of ministry here at Bergen Evangelical Presbyterian, there are lots of sermons that I cherish. One of the most important of those was an overview of the book of Revelation. In that sermon, I looked throughout the book to see the number of times that Jesus is referred to. I don't remember the exact number, just that it was a huge number, as in the hundreds, so as I was thinking and praying about what to do this year's Christmas sermon series on, I thought about the book of Revelation.

This really became reality as I was talking with another pastor who talked about the whole idea of advent is preparing our hearts and minds for the future, and so I wanted to take the time out to look at the last few chapters of Revelation and put these chapters in the context of Christ's first coming and why we celebrate Christmas. We will see that Christmas means that the one who will eventually crush Satan for eternity has come, that He who makes all things new has come, that He who will bring heaven to Earth has come, that He who brings eternal life has come, and that He who has come will come again.

This Sunday, we will see that He who will crush Satan (Revelation 20:1-10) has come to Earth. We do not need to put too much stock in Satan (such as saying "The devil made me do it."), but at the same time we do not need to overlook him. Scripture describes him as our adversary who is a liar and comes as an angel of light. He is a major reason for all our difficulties in this life, especially the persecution of our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ. But the Bible shows us that Jesus has defeated Satan through His death and resurrection, and that one day, this will result in his eventual eternal destruction.

Next, we will see that through Jesus, God the Father will make everything new (Revelation 21:1-8): "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear

from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away" (verses 3-4). Just picture in your mind if you can what it will mean to no longer have mourning, crying, pain, and more than anything, no more death. Life will radically change for us, and this is all made possible only with the one who we celebrate this Christmas season.

Next, we will see that Jesus will bring Heaven to Earth (Revelation 21:9-27). What this shows is the community we will one day be a part of. I love church families, and I will always cherish Bergen Evangelical Presbyterian. I

love the joy and the love that is there every Sunday. That is just a mere reflection of what our community will be like when the One that we celebrate will bring heaven to earth, bringing perfect peace and harmony to not only those Christians we are with now, but those loved

ones who have gone before us.

Of course, no celebration would be complete without the main reason that Jesus has come and that is to forgive our sins and bring us eternal life (Revelation 22:1-5). We often hear and say things like He was born to die which points towards His death on the cross for us. Of all the things that we should think about Christmas, this should be foremost on our minds and hearts. Of course, following His death was His resurrection which is essential as otherwise we would still be in our sins and without hope in this life and the next. The joy of Christmas consistently reminds us that our joy is complete as we celebrate our risen Savior who was born to save us.

Finally, after Christmas, we will see that the one who was born, died, rose again, and ascended into heaven will come back again (Revelation 22:6-21), and all that we hope for in this life and the next life will finally be accomplished through Jesus, who has filled us with joy this Christmas season. "Come, Lord Jesus" (verse 20).

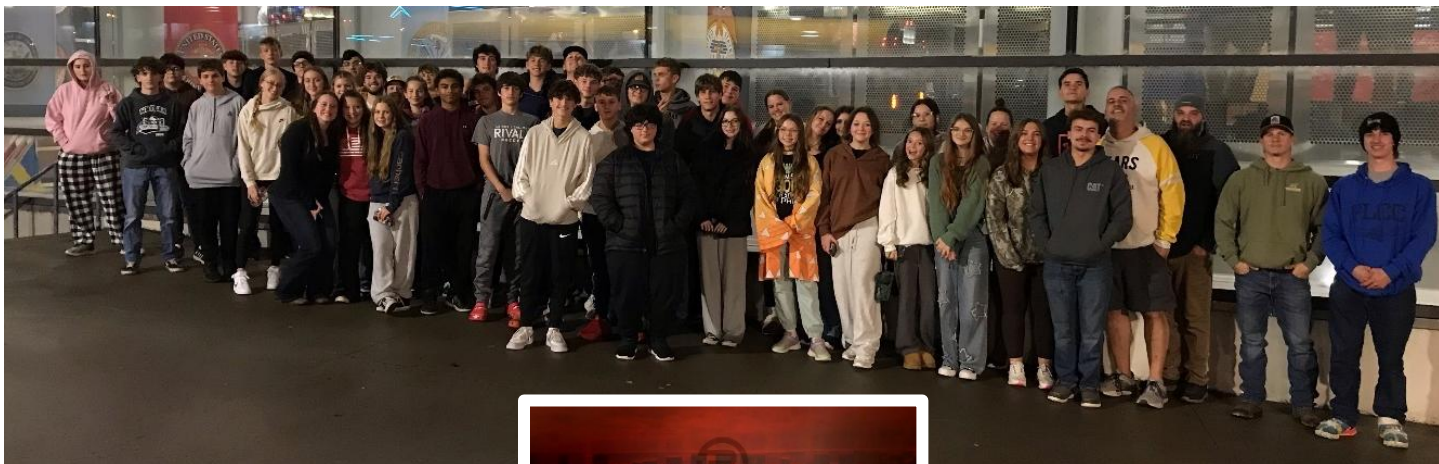

### Need for Emergency Services Hits Historic High at Open Door Mission

Open Door Mission is the December Mission of the Month. Since 1952, Open Door Mission has provided emergency services and hope to those in Rochester who need a new start. Their success in providing emergency care has been made possible through the dedicated support of faithful donors such as our church.

2025 brought in cold weather for many months. The number of guests in Open Door Mission's emergency shelters are the highest they have been in its almost 75-year history. The increase is the result of many factors including: an increase in individuals battling addiction; untreated mental illness; the adverse effects of New York State's changing laws; decreased supply of independent, safe affordable housing; and decreased funding for emergency beds.

We will learn more about the work of Open Door Mission on December 14 when Chris Scribani from the Open Door staff comes to our worship service to speak to us.

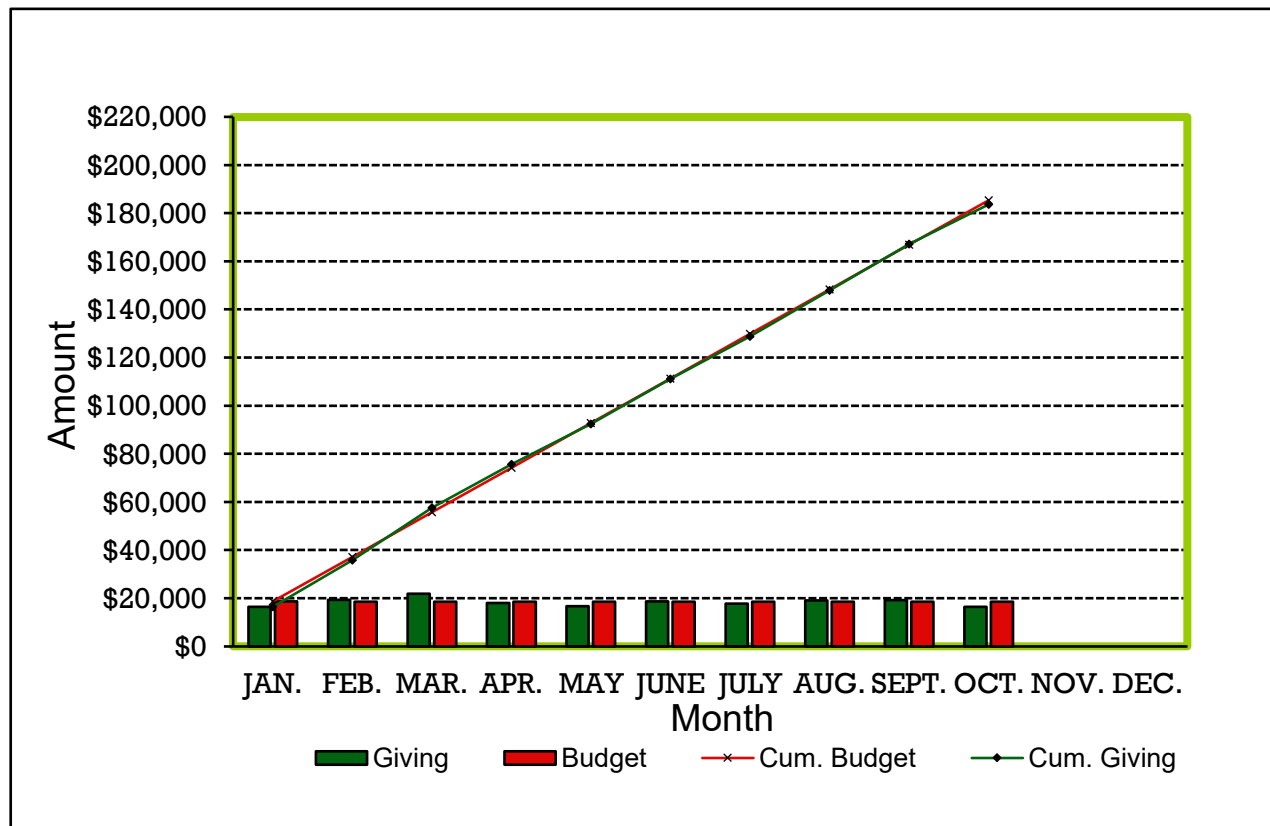
# Church Finances
