imagination, and like all hurt and suffering in the Bible, God's Word never belittles that hurt. After all, a hundred denarii was a lot of money, but in comparison to how much God has forgiven us? There can be no comparison.

There will be many issues that we will cover as a church leading up to the series on outreach. These will all be important because they make us more of a witnessing church to those that need it, but I think that out of all of these, forgiveness might be the most important one. Why? Because forgiving someone really shows not only do we understand the Gospel, but we are seeking to live it out.

This fall we have been allowed to restart all of our on campus programs! We are also spearheading new clubs at a new campus as well! The start of these programs has gone exceedingly well and we are praying this will lead to fruitful opportunities with these students.

Streams in the Desert

Recently in Adult SS we were studying the book of Nahum, which describes God's judgment on the city of Nineveh. One of the passages we looked at was 1:4-5 which reads in the ESV:

He rebukes the sea and makes it dry; he dries up all the rivers; Bashan and Carmel wither; the bloom of Lebanon withers. The mountains quake before him; the hills melt; the earth heaves before him, the world and all who dwell in it.

We discussed that although God had delayed judgment on Nineveh (verse 2 says He is "slow to anger"), His judgment will surely come on the wicked. This passage points out that even those things that seem "eternal" to us – seas, rivers, hills, and mountains – cannot stand before the Lord. Three of the most fertile areas of the ancient lands in and around Israel were Bashan, Carmel, and Lebanon. These were lush areas that Nahum says will wither in the light of God's judgment.

The warning to those who do not heed God's commands is clear from these words of the prophet Nahum. But there is another side to the story.

I was in a service of lament where Isaiah 35 was read. Verses 1 and 2 read:

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad; the desert shall rejoice and blossom like the crocus; it shall blossom abundantly and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God.

Here we see the same areas talked about. However, in this case, God is promising blessing to those who are experiencing "desert" times. Instead of God's judgment on the wicked, we see God's love and mercy on His people, those who live in repentance and obedience. I hope these words are a comfort to those who might be experiencing a desert time in their lives.




Dec 23, 2022


