## **From the Pastor**

We will soon be starting in on a sermon series on outreach and evangelism very soon, and through that series, my hope is that we will become a church that will seek to reach out to the lost in and around our community. Through that, we will encounter some non-Christians, and chances are they will not have a Biblical worldview. In those encounters, it is vitally important that our worldview and our actions are not changed, but remain true to Scripture.

So what is the worldview of the culture around us? So, there are several sources that I use, especially from a Christian point of view, and one of the best is thegospelcoalition.org. From that website, one can read about "Ivan Provorov (a professional hockey player on the Philadelphia Flyers) who chose not to wear a Pride-themed jersey during warmups. When asked why he didn't express support for LGBT+ causes in this way, Provorov said he respected 'everybody's choices' but that he'd chosen to 'be true to himself' and 'his religion.'" And of course, the media pounced. As Trevin Wax noted, "One commentator broke down in tears on air—overcome, I suppose, by the unthinkable horror that someone somewhere who occupies a place in polite society dissents from sexual revolution ideology."

In Canada, culture seems to have completely left God and His ethics behind. "In March 2023, Canada will begin assisting the mentally ill by terminating their lives. Canada first legalized medical assistance in dying (MAiD) in 2016. Bill C-7 in 2021 expanded the criteria for MAiD beyond those who had a foreseeable death. Now, a further expansion will allow those with mental illness to receive a prescription for death.

The slope is not only slippery—the ground below MAiD collapsed into the pit of the earth. We should expect the requests of parents to end their children's lives to soon be granted. We will not have post-birth abortion; we will have parents requesting to have their children receive the care given by medical assistance in dying. Lest I be accused of exaggeration, Quebec's college of physicians has already (in 2021) recommended euthanizing infants and teenagers.

The euphemism "medical assistance in dying" means a medical professional will administer drugs that end the life of a patient.

In traditional language, MAiD is euthanasia. And, it's the new normal in Canada.

The stories of people applying for MAiD in combination with the sympathetic reception of MAiD among Canadians will force Canadian Christians into conflict because any attempt to save someone's life will invoke the ire of those who call death good and preserving life wrong."

However, in my opinion, there is no more evidence of our culture departing from a Biblical worldview than in regards to gender. From the site, lifesitenews.com, here are just a few of the headlines: 8,000 teens now seeking puberty blockers, trans hormones in the UK, trans ideology left runaway gender-confused teen prey to sex traffickers and rapists, Christian teacher jailed after refusing to use trans pronouns set free by Ireland's High Court, medical professionals are being trained to help kids keep 'gender identity' secrets from parents, a teenage girl freaks out over seeing a biological man nude in the YMCA and the media take the man's side, 4 year olds are taught what non-binary (neither male nor female) is, and in Scotland, a rapist decided he was no longer a man only after appearing in court on a rape charge and he would be held in a women's prison.

All of the trans headlines point to a society that is not only departing from a Biblical worldview, but is increasingly disregarding God as their Creator, especially a good Creator. They are not content with the way that God made them and are seeking to push their Creator out of their lives.

Here is why this is important to know while we witness to the culture around us. We will encounter viewpoints and a worldview that is far different than a Biblical worldview. There is always a temptation in our witness, as we seek to become friends with non-Christians (as well as we should) to give in to the way they see things, and in this culture, that means gender, sexuality, and even life and death, but we must be so rooted in Scripture and how our Creator made us, that we never falter from a Biblical worldview. That takes a lot of time in studying Scripture and prayer to ensure that we not get offtrack in the way we view all of God's creation.

# Update from Berti Berhami in Albania

Our church has a decades-long relationship with Berti who ministers through CRU. Again this year, he continues to be part of our E&M annual budget. Here are some snippets from a year-end summary of 2022. If you want to subscribe to his newsletter electronically, contact Gregg McAllister.

From Berti: We are in awe and filled with thanksgiving for what God has allowed in our midst and for the privilege to be a part of it. Your faithful prayers and generous financial partnership with our staff and ministry has played a vital part in seeing such spiritual fruit. Be encouraged and join us in praising God for this amazing opportunity to have an eternal impact in Albania and to the ends of the earth.

Summer is the most fruitful seasons in our ministry. This year, our staff teams together with our international partners led outreach efforts and summer camps in 20 major cities across Albania. A total of 1,371 people participated in these camps. Nearly half of them had a unique and life-changing experience discussing the truth of the gospel, and 71 indicated that they put their faith in Christ.

After outreaches in cities, students who were interested to know more about faith were invited to a retreat at The Lighthouse beach camp, where our staff and volunteers invested in them on a more personal level. Additionally, the camp was made available to local churches for family retreats. The campground was fully booked throughout the summer, with a total of 751 participants. In total, 381 people had a wonderful experience in discipleship and fellowship; 370 youth heard the truth of the gospel. Of those, 23 professed to have placed their faith in Christ, and 18 were baptized in the Adriatic Sea.


# Church Finances End-of-Year 2022

"Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions and give to the needy. Provide yourselves with moneybags that do not grow old, with a treasure in the heavens that does not fail, where no thief approaches and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

Luke 12:32-34

Giving for December was good, \$18,070, and greater than the monthly goal of \$17,658. Overall for the year giving to the budget was \$201,793, \$4,000 higher than last year, and the highest giving level in the history of the church.

Our expenditures for the year, however, were also the highest in our history, \$212,853, and even exceeded the budget by a small amount (\$957). These high expenditures and the negative impact the current large rate of inflation had on our investments drove the Accumulated Income Fund (AIF) into negative territory (-\$536) at the end of 2022. Already, however, there have been some gifts into the AIF for 2023, and the balance in back in the black today.
