From the Pastor

If you have noticed, I have started including the Lord's Prayer in the worship service on the last Sunday of the month. I am a little cautious about this because praying the Lord's Prayer can become something that we just go through the motions of saying with it having no real meaning, not that we are guilty of that, but there is a danger in praying it on a regular basis without a real sense of what it is we are praying. For me, I wanted to take the time to go through the Lord's Prayer first, so we really grasp hold of what we are praying. Now that we are done with the series on evangelism, I thought these columns would be a great way of doing that.

Before we get to the Lord's Prayer in Matthew 6:9-13, we first need to look at the context. Jesus is speaking in Matthew 6:5-6: "And when you pray, you must not be like the hypocrites. For they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, that they may be seen by others. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. ⁶ But when you pray, go into your room, shut the door, and pray to your Father in secret. And your Father, who sees in secret, will reward you."

The word that Jesus used is the Greek word, hypokrites. It is the word that is used in referring to an actor, someone who would play a part that they are not in reality. So, Jesus is saying not to be like them. Don't play the part and pray to be seen by others. (He says the same thing about giving and fasting.)

Now, this doesn't mean that we shouldn't pray in public. Jesus prayed in public (Luke 3:21 and John 11:41-42). It's not that we shouldn't pray in public, it's that we shouldn't want to be seen by other people as we pray.

So, how do we combat this? Especially myself and others who pray during our worship service? Well, Jesus made a point that our prayer lives should center around what we pray in private. Again, not that we shouldn't pray in public, but the amount of time that we pray should much more be centered around our

private prayers. DA Carson put it this way, "The person who prays more in public than in private reveals that he is less interested in God's approval than in human praise. Not piety but a reputation for piety is his concern."

Notice that both types of public prayer that Jesus is talking about will get you rewards. What are those rewards? Public prayer to be seen by others will sometimes get you praise from other people, while private prayer will give you the reward of spending time with your heavenly Father who is the Creator and Sustainer of all things.

Think about that. It's always nice to be thought of well by others, but the problem is that like anything that takes the place of God in our lives is what we would call an idol. Like all idols, we think that the praise of people will satisfy us, but it never truly does. Why? Because we are always wanting more of people's praises, but like anyone who depends on the praise, those praises can and often does turn to criticisms, and we are left desolate, desperately wanting to hear people tell us how great we are, but we often get the very opposite.

This reward is much different from the reward that we receive when we pray in private. That reward is knowing we have a caring, loving Father who sees all things, and like every good Father, wants us to come to Him with all of our problems, cares, and worries; who will hear our prayers every single time, and answer them in His Wisdom.

So, as we study the Lord 's Prayer and as we pray it on the last Sunday of the month, let us not only pray it publicly, but use it as a model for private prayer as well.


Ecumenical VBS

Sewing With a Purpose

Sewing with A Purpose worked on flannel hearts and eye protections for the NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit) of Golisano Strong Hospital in Rochester. These tiny 1 - 2 pound babies receive specialized care to survive. The Sewing With A Purpose Team made an incredible number of flannel hearts during the months of March and April. More than 200 flannel hearts were cut, sewn, hand stitched and ironed. The hearts are distributed to the NICU in bundles of 50 at a time. Each Mom/baby



receives 2 flannel hearts. The Mom places the heart on her chest where the Mother's scent is transferred to the flannel heart. Then the heart is placed in the incubator where the baby lies on the flannel heart and bonds with

the Mother's scent. The Dad's use these hearts, too, to bond with their tiny babies. The 200 hearts created by the team will be enough to supply Golisano NICU for the rest of 2024! Way to go SWP Team!!!!

The SWP team also created more than 70 flannel eye

protections for the NICU. These are used to protect the baby's delicate eyes when they are placed



under a blue light. Thank you Team!

Foodlink Serves Our Neighbors

The April Foodlink distribution was MUCH warmer than the March day. We thank the approximately 40 volunteers who assisted in unloading and distributing the food. The food was provided to 172 families, representing 166 kids, 244 adults and 145 senior citizens.

Rochester Adult & Teen Challenge exists for individuals to experience freedom by making disciples and helping them to Know Christ, Grow in Christ, Serve Christ, and Share what Christ has done for them. The testimonies recounted changed lives through a saving knowledge of Jesus that provided freedom from addiction to drugs and alcohol.

- Office & classroom supplies
- Over the counter medicine such as Tylenol, Ibuprofen cold & flu etc.

We are arranging a trip to visit the facility in Rochester.

When that is scheduled, we will collect items to take with us. More information on the visit will follow.




Church Finances March 2024

March's giving was \$19,036 for the monthly financial support of the annual budget. Based on the approved 2024 annual budget, the monthly support needed is \$18,521 per month. This is about \$515 more than budget estimate. Expenses were as is expected for a typical March, but March is the end of the quarter, which means quarterly obligations had to be met. This led to \$4,500 being transferred from the AIF to pay these quarterly obligations.
