From the Pastor

I wanted to take a pause on looking at the Lord's Prayer for now to write about our church's children's and youth ministry. Like I have heard from many of you, I am very thankful for Mitch's ministry while he was on staff as our child and youth minister. He started something from the ground up and gave us as a church a sense of calling to minister to children, teenagers, and their families. Even more than that, I can say that as a parent, he made a deep impression upon my children in following Christ.

I will be honest with you in saying the loss of Mitch's ministry will be difficult to overcome, but it is something that we will be able to do. The first thing I think is for me to thank the elders who have shown an incredible amount of love and wisdom during this time. I also wanted to let you know that Mitch and I are still in contact, and we are seeking to continue a mentoring relationship, just as I have found valuable mentors in my life. I am excited in the ways that God will use Mitch in the future.

I feel like it is also important to appreciate Joe's ministry with TAG, as well as Young Life, that meets at the church. These ministries fill a void for ministry to teenagers while we search for another child/youth minister who will come onto our staff.

For that end, we will soon be starting up another committee to look for another child/youth minister. Please pray about if God is leading YOU to serve on this committee.

The next thing I wanted to share was about Kid's Quest. The session has asked that we continue with Kid's Quest for every other week. Right now, I have at least five people who have volunteered to help out, and we might be looking for more. One need is for someone to coordinate those volunteers, so if you feel that God is leading you to do that, please let me know.

Finally, I realized that we needed a good curriculum with Bible-centered teaching and activities for the volunteers to lead with minimal preparation. I asked other children's ministers what they suggested, and the best curriculum that I came up with is called "The Biggest Story." From their website: "The Biggest Story leads readers on an exciting journey through the Bible, from the garden of Eden to the return of Christ. This fun curriculum based on the book draws kids into Scripture and helps them grasp its overarching message of redemption."

I have ordered the first volume of *The Biggest Story* to see if it is a good fit for our church. I will say that I think this will help us fill the void until we find a new child/youth minister. It is vitally important that we pray that God will lead us to a new child and youth minister that will enable us to reach young people for Christ and thus, fulfill the Great Commission by witnessing to them and disciplining them within the context of our church family.

Foodlink Returns March 20th

Pop Up Pantries (or PUPs) help us quickly distribute healthy food, primarily in rural communities, and bring emergency food relief to parts of our service area that have limited access to traditional food pantries.

- Foodlink sets up 40+ PUPs each month
- On average, Foodlink distributes 12,000 pounds of food per PUP

calendars and plan to help. We ask volunteers to arrive by 2:45 pm. We will begin unloading the food truck at 3 pm with a goal of opening the food line at 4 pm. We are generally done by 5:30 pm. Even if you can't volunteer for that long, we can find a spot for you

The distribution is in the church parking lot, so please dress for the weather. We ask volunteers to park in the Methodist Church lot across the street to allow the spots in our lot to be open for our clients.

Why is it important to offer these monthly food distributions? Prices for food have continued to climb, which is causing significant challenges to low-income families, often referred to as ALICE. ALICE, an acronym for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed, is a new way of defining and understanding the struggles of households that earn above the Federal Poverty Level, but not enough to afford a bare-bones household budget.

Working through Foodlink, we are able to bring no-cost food to our neighbors in need. Foodlink serves a 10-county area surrounding Rochester. We are fortunate to be able to coordinate and bring the free food they offer here to Bergen.



Foodlink serves 10 counties in the Rochester and Finger Lakes region of New York: Allegany, Genesee, Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Orleans, Seneca, Wayne, Wyoming and Yates. Our service area is more than 7,000 miles, which stretches from the lake shore to the Pennsylvania border.

Special Lenten Offering

Our church family traditionally collects a special offering during Lent. This year the Evangelism and Missions Committee recommends splitting the offering between a local organization and a mission in Africa.

Locally, money would go to the Byron-Bergen Backpack program. This community effort helps needy children in the B-B school system who often don't have food in their homes over the weekend. The kids, identified by school staff, receive a backpack of food that they can consume over the weekend when they are not in school to be fed breakfast and lunch.

The number of children identified as needing this support has increased over the last couple of years. Food costs have also increased, putting an additional strain on the program that is administered by the Byron Presbyterian Church. Donations are the only support this program receives.

For the international mission, E&M suggests that half the funds go to the Kimia Leprosy Center in Congo, where Sarah Speer is based. An increased number of patients, without increased financial support, has put a severe strain on its operations. The budget has been frozen with a \$7,000 deficit. Sarah has not asked us for money, but has made us aware of the situation. She has asked that we pray about this.

All financial contributions should be marked as "Lenten offering", and can be offered through our traditional methods of a check in the offering boxes, or paid online beginning now through Easter. Money received will be equally divided between the local and international mission.


One thing this study has really impressed upon us is the need to take time to study the Bible. It's a constant encouragement to us in our Christian walk and it helps us grow in our faith.

Operation Christmas Child (OCC) March - monthly update

BEPC will once again be a community drop-off location and the Central Drop-off location for the Genesee Valley Region in 2025 during National Collection Week-November 17-24.

The first quarterly meeting for the Genesee Valley Region team was held February 23 in the Fellowship Hall. The team is excited to see what God has planned for OCC 2025. The goal of reaching 20,153 children with the Gospel was set. That is more than 5,000 shoeboxes that will need to be packed this year to send the Gospel to the 'ends of the Earth' from our region. It's a big goal but....GOD IS BIGGER!!! Our Genesee Valley Team scripture verse for 2025 is Ephesians 2:10 (NLT) For we are God's masterpiece. He has created us anew in Christ Jesus, so we can do the good things he planned for us long ago.

To keep our congregation up to date on OCC throughout the year, look for information posted on the bulletin board across from the Mission board. We will also be continuing to collect items throughout the year. With winter hopefully winding down soon, please consider buying hats, scarves, mittens/gloves-many stores will have clearance sales soon. 


Church Finances January 2025
