An Update from Session

With Pastor Brandt and his family on a well-deserved vacation, and the COVID-19 pandemic finally appearing to pass, your Church Session is using this space to provide you with several updates on how we are prayerfully moving forward into the second half of 2021 with several initiatives. The first two updates are ongoing, the second two are forthcoming.

First, with many thanks to Brenda Reber for her faithful service, we are currently seeking a new **Church Administrative Assistant**. As shared in the weekly Life in the Church announcements, packets containing job information, application forms, and instructions are available outside the Church Office. Applications are still being accepted. Please seal and return a completed application in the provided envelope to Seth McNear's mailbox by the church office. Alternately, copies of the necessary documents can be emailed to him at beccaseth@hotmail.com.

Second, we are continuing our search for an Assistant Worship Coordinator. This person will work closely with the Music Coordinator and Pastor on all music-related activities at the church, including weekly musical participation in the worship service and leading the worship service once per month. If interested, please submit a letter of inquiry to <fpcbergen@gmail.com>; include "Assistant Music Coordinator Search" in the subject of the email. Questions about this part-time position may be addressed to Rob Willhoft at (585) 293-1304.

Third, our church pipe organ needs restoration work. Built in 1907 and repaired in 1964 and 1989, the instrument requires deep cleaning, repair, and refurbishment. The cost of this work is \$85,560. To begin the process of addressing this need, Session has formed an **Organ Restoration Fund**. Please prayerfully consider whether you would be willing to provide a financial gift toward this work. Please also plan to stay after church on Sunday, July 25 for a short presentation about the instrument work. Scot Huntington, a past president of the Organ Historical Society, has agreed to speak with us about the instrument. Alden Snell will also play a few pieces on the organ and lead a hymn sing as part of this event.

Fourth, Session is considering ways to grow our **children's ministry**. When Pastor Brandt returns from vacation in early July, a committee will be formed to evaluate how a new staff position could be used to grow this ministry within our church. Please pray about whether you might be willing to serve on this committee.

Dear Members and Friends of Bergen Evangelical Presbyterian Church,

The purpose of this letter is to update you on the status of our church's pipe organ and its need of substantial restoration work. There will be a brief meeting about the organ after the worship service on <u>Sunday</u>, July 25. Scot Huntington, a past president of the Organ Historical Society has agreed to share more information about the organ and there will be a short performance and hymn singing led by Alden Snell. Look for more information about this event soon.

Built in 1907, renovated in 1964, and repaired—by the men of our church!—in 1989, the organ requires some tender loving care so it can continue to facilitate singing and worship at our church. Representatives from Parsons Pipe Organ Builders have extensively reviewed the instrument, as well as Scot Huntington. All speak positively about our organ, including the quality of work done in 1964 and 1989. Following is a brief summary of the work needed:

- 1) General cleaning of entire instrument (this includes every pipe in the instrument)
- 2) Disassemble wind chest bottom and repair with correct length screws
- 3) Disassemble and repair keyboards (the keyboards are warped and uneven)
- 4) Regulate key action (the keys require different amounts of pressure to press and play)
- 5) Remove, check, and repair pedal board
- 6) Install walk-board for safe access to instrument
- 7) Replace air regulator (this is the only non-mechanical part of the instrument: it provides the air that sounds through the pipes)
- 8) Replace wind connector sleeves (connects blower in basement to regulator (#7))
- 9) Mount chamber lighting
- 10) Reconnect tubular chimes and regulate/re-wire

This work would require approximately eight weeks and would cost \$85,560. The proposed work is inter-connected: the repairs cannot realistically be broken down into smaller, more financially manageable phases. While the instrument can continue to be used "as is," dust, dirt, and the air regulator issues will eventually ruin the instrument.

Envisioning this restoration work as an opportunity for serving both our congregation and the community, the Church Session is considering several outreach ventures featuring the restored instrument, including but not limited to hymn sings and community concerts featuring Eastman School of Music organ students and other organists interested in our instrument. This could lead to additional music outreach including a broader variety of musical styles such as other worship music styles in a coffee-house atmosphere.

This is an expensive and extensive repair. To begin addressing the financial need, Session has authorized formation of an Organ Restoration Fund. We ask that you begin to prayerfully consider whether you would be willing to provide a financial gift toward the organ restoration. Questions about the project may be directed to the Organ Restoration Team: Fred Ely, Tom Jones, Alden Snell, and Rob Willhoft. We hope you can join us after the worship service on July 25 to learn more.

The online worship service now reaches more than a thousand people during the course of each week. In addition, many folks, literally from all over the country, are joining the online intercessory prayer group organized by Uli's church.

Praise God! This is an answer to prayers of many years by Uli and his wife, Deena. They prayed for ways to expand the outreach of the Sunday messages, but costs for television were prohibitive. Now, with the use of technology like FaceBook as COVID struck, they have been able to reach so many more people.

When asked for specific prayer requests, Uli offered these:

God's provision of funds to purchase higher quality equipment that will make it easier and quicker to prepare the Sunday service for online sharing.

To keep the online prayer group growing

Healing for Deena's knees that are causing her pain

Lifting of COVID restrictions that have had a negative impact on the local congregation

Our church has added Sarah Speer to the missionaries we financially support through the Evangelism & Mission budget this year. Sarah works with the Aka Pygmies at the Kimia Care Center in the Congo. Read about her work and the way she is spreading the gospel to the many leprosy patients served by the center.

John Gay has worked with Sarah when he was in the Congo on short-term mission trips and says she is an amazing Christian dedicated to serve the Aka Pygmies and treat their leprosy. The bandages, pillow case dresses, and shorts created by our church's Sewing With a Purpose team plus others, have gone in the past to Sarah for use by her patients. More suitcases are ready to go, and we are making contacts with MissionGO to have them delivered to the Congo.

Rescue the Perishing: A Neglected People

What is the most important responsibility of a Christian in the world today? When examining Scripture, we are to look into the life and character of Jesus Christ and mirror our lives to His example. We are to follow His last command of going into the world to make disciples of all nations, teaching them to obey and follow Him. Our obligation to the Lord is to further His kingdom by seeking to tell and display the love of Christ among the nations. *And this is exactly what we are doing in the Republic of Congo with our MissionGO ministries including the Kimia Leprosy Center in the Congo*.

Our work at the Kimia Leprosy Center is vital as we are the only leprosy center in the region -- and these people would have no other way of getting this treatment. An old hymn reads, "All because we do not love them, millions fill the heathen grave; brother can you see them perish, when a little love would save? Love undying, love eternal -- will impel us to our duty." What a joy it is to bring lasting physical treatment coupled with lasting eternal hope for a neglected people.

Out Kymia Leprosy Center is a respite for those suffering with a horrible disease. We are currently at full capacity at the Center with 28 residents, as we administer treatment for leprosy. Treatment may last from 6 months to a year depending on the stage of their leprosy. It is important that they are treated at the Center, as the concept of taking the treatment in a timely manner is not well understood in their culture.

Untreated bacteria destroys the skin and nerves over time. Leprosy can cause deformity, crippling and blindness. With treatment, tremendous effects will occur as the medicine halts the process completely! As it will not repair past cellular damage, our missionaries train residents and their families on how to take care of affected limbs (such as wearing socks, using rolled up leaves to grab a warm pot, etc.) We proactively take medical trips deep into the tropical rain forest on a regular basis to find individuals with signs of leprosy and others who need medical attention for various tropical diseases. Our missionaries, Sarah and Serge, often have to cut out infections, repair broken bones and practice wound care.

Cultural Background: While 95% of the world's population has a natural immunity to leprosy, the Aka Pygmies in whom we serve are not immune. In fact, they are prone to it. Sadly, they are the downtrodden and known as outcasts of society, as they are treated very poorly by other tribal groups. However, we bring hope to them and tell them of their true identity in Jesus! Because this people group is vastly unreached, this is the first time they are hearing the name of Jesus, and their hearts are open!

The ultimate goal is not only to alleviate their temporary suffering, but also for these cherished people to learn of the One who suffered that they may be wonderfully and intimately known by Jesus Christ.

Their Creator knows exactly what ails them and has the power to heal. While we work to restore their community in tangible ways, we also seek to restore their spiritual brokenness. Recently, through the impact of Bible studies, a young man received Christ and asked one of our missionaries to be involved in his baptism and be a spiritual mentor.

These crucial ministries are funded by faithful supporters like you. If these ministries do not have the support, there are no others to replace us in this work! Not only do we strongly desire to maintain these ministries, but also we have many opportunities to grow. Acres surround our property and the ways to expand are numerous to meet our growing demand. This is a pivotal time in us praying and seeking the Lord's leading on the Kimia Center and a Feeding and Nutrition Program.

Our immediate need is \$56,000 to support these ongoing ministries and their operation through the end of the year. Your gift today will provide such things as: nutrition for our patients and their families at the Center, fuel and repairs for vehicles, surgeries, medical supplies, medical screening equipment, upkeep and maintenance, river trips for finding new patients, seeds, additional food items from the local market, support for our North American missionaries in the Congo, and so much more. Your financial gifts of kindness go directly to meet the needs of the Congolese who are in desperate need of physical attention and spiritual truth. By giving a one-time or recurring donation, you "rescue the perishing, care for the dying" and help us "tell them a Savior has died." By His wounds, we are healed. Amen!


Administrative Assistant Job Opening




Church Finances May 2021

With a total giving of \$19,420 for May, our church has responded to April's poor results in a very convincing way. The monthly total was helped by the fact that there were five weeks in which to receive the mailed-in, left at the church, and on-line giving; never-theless, \$19,420 is \$2,000 above the budget, by far the highest of the year, and the best monthly giving in many years. With expenses for May being quite low, \$13,170, no help from the AIF was needed, and the checking account balance is unusually high at \$4,000 going into June.
