There are many times that I feel very providentially blessed to be the pastor of Bergen Presbyterian. This is especially true from all of the people within the church. It truly feels like a church family. However, there are other things as well, such as great church facilities and the weather in Western New York.

There was one more thing though that was added on Sunday to help me appreciate being the pastor here and that is hearing about the history of the organ, but it was really more than that. It was hearing about the history of the church, particularly the history of the worship of Bergen Presbyterian. To know that I stand in the pulpit where the Gospel has been proclaimed and songs were sung to the glory of God (I am sure that other pastors had a better singing voice than my own) for over a century sent shivers up my spine and incredibly humbled me. It was then that I really earnestly prayed that we might come up with the funds to restore the organ, not that I had not been doing that earlier, but hearing all of that brought some insight into the organ and the rich history that it has brought Bergen Presbyterian in a really special way, as I am sure it did for all of you.

As Tom said, we have a lot of things that we are looking to do now that we are coming back to normal, including hiring an assistant worship leader and children's minister, but I think restoring the organ is also very important in the life of our church.

However, I don't want us to look at it as just giving money to restore an organ. That is important, but as with everything that we give money towards, whether it is the organ, the building, children's minister, etc., it is given because we have an incredible amount of gratitude towards God and what He has done for us through the Gospel. J.I. Packer put it like this, "The secular world never understands Christian motivation. Faced with the question of what makes Christians tick, unbelievers maintain that Christianity is practiced only out of self-serving purposes.... From the plan of salvation I learn that the true driving force in authentic Christian living is, and ever must be, not the hope of gain but the heart of gratitude."

Out of this gratitude, Romans 12:1 tells us how we are to serve God as living sacrifices: "Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship." I really think that Alden did a wonderful job when he closed the program on Sunday (which I am sorry I had to miss due to a being a representative of presbytery to Brighton Presbyterian). He impressed upon us that we are just not giving to the organ, but we are giving to the glory of God. My hope and prayer is that whenever we give to the church for whatever reason, we do so out of gratitude of the Gospel and to the glory of God.

The Organ Renovation Project



July 25, 2021 – The Pledge Drive

The Goal: With detailed reports in hand from Parsons Pipe Organ Builders on the condition of our early 1900's organ, the Session is considering a major renovation to get our organ back to its full capabilities. Their estimate for the full cost of the renovation was approximately \$85,000 if the job were to be completed in 2021; it may be a little more for 2022. Since Parsons' schedule for big jobs this year is full, the overall goal is to enter into a contract with Parsons in or after January of 2022 with the work to be done that year. To reach this goal, we will need to raise the funds required, or at least to have the steps in place by the end of this year that would give us the ability to sign a contract with Parsons early in 2022.

The Plan: The total cost of \$85,000 would be a significant challenge for our church, and particularly at this time with the effects of COVID-19 still with us, and with our announced plan for the additions to our staff of an Assistant Worship Leader and a Children's Minister. For these reasons, the Session has set up a two-step fund raising program: (1) to measure whether the members and friends of this church would fully financially support this endeavor, and (2) if that support is forthcoming to being able to call for that funding with the knowledge that we can meet the cost goal.

The Steps: Today is the kick-off of a Pledge Drive asking all of us, members and friends, to express their support and willingness to financially support the renovation of our organ by completing and returning the attached "Pledge Card". The Drive is to extend to the end of 2021, at which time the Session will assess the results and make a determination if there is sufficient support to proceed to the next step of a Fund Drive. That Drive would run for a year-and-a-half from January 2022 to June 2023 during which time the pledges previously made are fulfilled. If the total of the pledges received by the end of this year falls a bit short, the Session will have the option of providing some funds from our existing reserves to make up the difference. However, if there is a clear lack of general support, the Session will let Parsons know we are not proceeding. Since the Session might have to decide at the end of the year to not proceed with this project, we are strongly urging that no funds (no cash, no checks, no credit card payments) for the project be submitted to the church until the end of the year and the Session's approval to continue.

Memorial Service for Adriane Broadbooks

Our church will host a memorial service for Adriane Broadbooks on Saturday, Aug. 7, at 11 am.

Adriane was a long-time member of our congregation and an Elder. She died on Jan. 7 at the LeRoy Village Green Nursing Home. Born March 20, 1927, in Niagara Falls, she was a daughter of the late James P. and Alida Van Esbroek Casey.

Raised in Rochester, Adriane was a graduate of Houghton College. She taught for many years at the Rochester Christian School. In the summers, she would go to Peniel Bible Conference in the Adirondacks, where she volunteered in the kitchen.

She married Herbert Broadbooks on Feb. 11, 1972, and assisted in operating the family farm in Byron until retirement. After living for a few years in California, they returned to western New York and lived in Bergen. In addition to being a member of our church, Adriane was a member of the Christian Women's Club in Batavia.

Survivors include a sister, Patricia Russell of Bergen; nieces Karen (Michael) Thunell, Diane (Donald) Cunningham and Cindy (Dennis) Burke of Bergen, Christine (Thomas) Silburn of Lake Luzerne, Kathy Matthews of Oregon; nephews, Michael Russell of Hawaii and Danny Russell of South Dakota; several grand-nieces and nephews.

You Can Help Provide School Supplies in Africa

EduNations is a mission that we support through our church Evangelism & Missions budget. They focus on sharing the gospel by building and staffing schools in a remote section of Sierra Leone. The organization has strong support within our Presbytery. Our annual support is being used for salaries for teachers.

EduNations recently opened a secondary (high) school after building several local elementary schools. Here is an update from EduNations detailing the current need to provide school supplies for the students.

Challenge

The COVID-19 pandemic affected all of us in some way this past year, and our organization is no exception. Due to the pandemic, we are experiencing a shortfall in our annual fundraising. However, despite our challenges, we will continue in our mission to provide students with a free education this coming school year.

Solution

As part of our free, quality education initiative, EduNations will be providing school supplies and uniforms to approximately 3,050 students this coming school year - our largest student population ever with the addition of our new Senior Secondary class starting this fall! This project will help us recover some of our losses we incurred through the pandemic, so that we are able to provide all of our students with quality and necessary supplies.

Long-Term Impact

These school supplies and uniforms are vital to each child's success in the classroom, and many, if not all, of our students could not afford these materials if we did not provide them. We believe that a free, quality education is key to a child rising out of poverty and living to their full potential. Through assisting them in education now, we believe that they will be able to make a difference in their own communities in the future.

This fall, 3,050 students will begin another school year at EduNations Hope Academy - our largest student population ever with the addition of our new Senior Secondary class!

Our goal is to raise \$10,860 to provide school supplies and uniforms to all 300 students who will be attending the Senior Secondary School this year.

The Senior Secondary School functions as a boarding home, where students come from their home village to live and receive their high school education. EduNations provides all our boarding home students with free education, living facilities, and three meals a day. This year, 300 students will attend our Senior Secondary School!



Each student chooses a focus of study - either Science, Commercial Business, or Arts. The school supplies these students receive will help them in their specific focus of study.

In addition, our boarding students are supplied with three uniforms, which are worn both at school and in the dormitories. Our students love having uniforms that signify their belonging to the EduNations community.


Church Finances June 2021

The giving for June was good - \$16,017 – and continued the very good monthly incomes for 2021. In fact, through mid-year of this year, the financial support of our church's budget has exceeded that for any year since 2017, and by several thousands of dollars each year. Expenses were high; nevertheless, no funds were needed from the AIF to meet expenses.

Some other financial events took place in June: We received a \$750 gift for the AIF and a \$5,000 gift for the Property Reserve Fund. Financial support was provided for two of our college youth with \$1,000 college scholarships, and \$3,800 was forwarded to Young Life of Genesee County for their summer camp program.
